Decides to establish an international independent expert mechanism, comprising three experts with law enforcement and human rights expertise, to be appointed by the President of the Human Rights Council, to be supported by the UN High Commissioner for Human Rights in order to further the agenda towards transformative change for racial justice and equality in the context of law enforcement globally, especially where relating to the legacies of colonialism and the Transatlantic slave trade in enslaved Africans, and to contribute to accountability and redress for victims; the mechanism should function in close collaboration with relevant special procedure mandate holders, including the Working Group of Experts on People of African Descent and the Special Rapporteur on contemporary forms of racism [...], also with the view to avoid duplication;

Also decides that the international independent expert mechanism shall have a three-year mandate, within the purview of its mandate, to advance racial justice and equality in the context of law enforcement in all parts of the world, by inter alia conducting country visits, inclusive outreach and consultations with States, directly affected individuals and communities, and other stakeholders, [...].

Further requests the High Commissioner and the international independent expert mechanism, to present to the Council, on an annual basis, starting from the 51st session, their respective written reports, jointly during an enhanced interactive dialogue, that prioritizes the participation of directly affected individuals and communities, including victims and their families, and transmitting its annual report to the General.

General Comments by Observers on the Decision Adopted during the session

- **Hungary**: on several draft resolutions adopted under Item 3, including on migration; elimination of violence against women and girls with disabilities.
- **Switzerland**: (L.6: welcomes the focus on the disappeared persons; decided not to join consensus on L.15; welcomes L.28/Rev.1.
- **Egypt**: welcomes L.28/Rev.1; L18/Rev.1 and L.23/Rev.1 reservations on certain provisions; L.3 on OP7, Egypt's position is in line with article 5 of the CRC; L.15 disassociates from the whole text; L.27 (PP14), L.5 and L.22.
- **Turkmenistan**: importance of respect for sovereignty, territorial integrity and non-interference in internal affairs; also in the case of China.
- **United States**: supported 13 draft resolutions, delivered 35 country statements and co-signed, 16 joint statements. Pledges to cooperate with the new mandate on racism created during this session.
- Iraq: reservations on several provisions of on L.15, L.18, L.23/Rev.1
- **Azerbaijan:** on Armenia's engagement during the discussion of draft resolution on international cooperation (L.10/Rev.1)
