and expertise to be provided by the Office, in particular in the areas of fact-finding, legal analysis, forensics, the human rights of women and girls and of persons belonging to minorities, the right to education, torture and other cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment, and additional resources for children's rights, translation, documentation, information- and evidence-gathering and -preservation; [...]; Requests the OHCHR to provide the SR with the assistance and resources necessary for the effective fulfilment of the mandate;

Requests the UN High Commissioner to end reporting on the implementation of Council decision 2/113 of 27 November 2006 and Council resolution 14/15 of 18 June 2010, and requests the OHCHR to enhance its monitoring and reporting on the overall situation of human rights in Afghanistan, and to update the Council thereon on an intersessional basis, as deemed necessary, and to present, under agenda item 2, a comprehensive report, including an analysis and recommendations on the institutional protection of human rights, to the Council at its 54th session, to be followed by an interactive dialogue; Urges all relevant special procedure mandate holders and invites treaty bodies to closely monitor and reflect on the situation of human rights in Afghanistan within the scope of their respective mandates; Decides to remain seized of the matter.
